A Message from MRAB Chairman David Osikowicz

On behalf of the Mining and Reclamation Advisory Board (MRAB) members, I am pleased to present for your review the Board's Annual Report, documenting the Board's activities from July 2016 through June 2017. The Board continues to address environmental problems related to past coal mining practices and to assist the Department in ensuring that current industry practices represent an environmentally responsible approach to mining. This report fulfills the statutory obligations of the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (SMCRA).

The Board holds four full board meetings per year, as outlined in the by-laws. For the 2016-2017 reporting period, full Board meetings were held on July 21, 2016, October 20, 2016, January 19, 2017 and April 6, 2017. The Regulation, Legislation and Technical Committee met on September 22, 2016 to discuss the Coal Fees Regulatory Package and, on March 30, 2017 to discuss the OSM Program Consistency Regulatory Package. Agendas for these meetings can be found on the MRAB web site.

The July 21, 2016 meeting was held at the Cambria District Mining Office in connection with the annual field trip the previous day. The Board toured the following acid mine drainage (AMD) treatment facilities during the field trip: 1) *Big J-Mining Sorber Site*; 2) *Shade Mining No. 3/Shaulis Site*; 3) *Florence Mining No. 1 Site*; and 4) *the Flight 93 AMD Treatment Facility and Memorial*.

During the time frame of this report, Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) staff provided the Board with regular updates on the status of Bond Rate Guidelines, Bureau of Abandoned Mine Reclamation (BAMR) Projects and the Alternative Bonding System (ABS) Legacy Sites. PA DEP staff also presented information to the Board on Land Reclamation Financial Guarantee; National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permitting reviews; Federal Office of Surface Mining (OSM) Oversight Activities; and Permit Decision Guarantee (PDG) policies.

The Board will continue to provide advice and technical input to the Department with regard to expenditures and program administration of Abandoned Mine Lands (AML) Title IV monies, proposed regulatory rulemaking issues including Act 95, permit fees, financial guarantee and OSM issues, and other environmental issues as they arise.

The Board recognizes the dedication and support of all Board members and alternates and the ongoing contributions by both PA DEP staff and Board members. Furthermore, the Board remains highly committed to advising and working with the department in carrying out its mission, evaluating the rights and responsibilities of

industry, and making responsible, calculated recommendations for the citizens of the Commonwealth.

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Introduction

The Mining and Reclamation Advisory Board (MRAB) was created in 1984 by Act 181 of the Pennsylvania General Assembly, which amended the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (SMCRA). The Board's purpose is to assist the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA DEP) in expending reclamation funds for the purposes provided by SMCRA and to advise the secretary on all matters pertaining to mining and reclamation. The advisory role of the Board also covers Title IV of the federal Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act, which relates to abandoned mine land reclamation issues.

The Board is comprised of the following members:

- Two licensed bituminous surface mine operators;
- One licensed anthracite surface mine operator;
- Four public members of the Citizens Advisory Council, elected by the Council;
- One anthracite or one bituminous licensed professional engineer;
- One county conservation district representative, appointed by the Pennsylvania State Conservation Commission;
- One majority party state senator, appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate;
- One minority party state senator, appointed by the president pro tempore of the Senate;
- One majority party state representative, appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives; and
- One minority party state representative, appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Board operates under bylaws adopted in January 1989 and amended in October 1993 and December 1996. The bylaws establish a committee structure and other operational procedures, including a minimum of four meetings per year, held in January, April, July and October, as required by SMCRA. *The bylaws current for the time period covered by this report are found in Appendix A.*

The Board's Committees

- **Annual Report Committee**

As mandated by Section 18(g)(5) of SMCRA, "The Board shall prepare an annual report on its activities and submit the report to the Senate Environmental Resources and Energy Committee and the House Conservation Committee." Throughout the reporting period, the committee compiles and summarizes information for inclusion in the Annual Report.

- **Reclamation Committee**

The Ad Hoc Committee on Reclamation Issues was originally formed at the July 1997 Board meeting in response to concerns regarding the Bark Camp Mine Reclamation Laboratory in Clearfield County, the Reed and Strattanville sites in Clarion County and, a package of reclamation initiatives being developed under PA DEP's "Reclaim PA" program.

At the October 22, 1999 MRAB quarterly meeting, the Board voted unanimously to change the name to the Reclamation Committee to reflect the committee's ongoing work. The committee addresses reclamation issues, initiatives and activities.

FULL BOARD

SMCRA mandates that the MRAB meet four times per year. Throughout the reporting period, the full Board met four times. The following sections provide a summary of the activities of the full Board. For a complete list of meeting dates and locations, see **Appendix D**. Also, for more details on these meetings, refer to the MRAB web site and, the MRAB meeting minutes.

2016-2017 MAIN AGENDA TOPICS (Presented Alphabetically)

Alternative Bond System (ABS) Legacy Trust Agreements

PA DEP provided regular updates regarding the status of ABS Legacy Trust Agreements. These arrangements included bonds, fully-funded trusts and partially-funded trusts.

Abandoned Mine Lands (AML) Grant Funding

PA DEP provided information on the status of AML grants, including the AML Pilot Program Grant for 2016 (\$30 million) and the regular AML Grant for 2017 (\$33.6 million). Additionally, it was reported that the Bureau of Abandoned Mine Reclamation (BAMR) plans to award \$5,500,000.00 in AML Economic Development Pilot Program funds for 2 specific projects: the Powderly Creek Northeast UMF - Lackawanna County (\$2,000,000.00) and the Ehrenfield project - Cambria County (\$3,500,000.00) and, that an additional \$640,000.00 in funds from this program would be included among the 98 contracts for future reclamation projects.

Blasting and Explosives Regulations (25 PA Code, Chapters 210 and 211)

PA DEP provided details on proposed changes to the blasting and explosives regulations in terms of definitions, enforcement, general requirements, blasting activity permits; blast reports; transportation; blasting activities; gases; pre-blast measures; and civil penalties. The MRAB voted to move this regulatory package on to the Environmental Quality Board (EQB) as a proposed rulemaking.

Bonding

Bond Rate Guidelines (BRG) – PA DEP provided the Board with its updated projection of the 2013 bond rates based on the average costs of recent reclamation projects. At the January 19, 2017 meeting, the proposed Land Reclamation Bond Rate Guidelines for 2017 were presented, indicating increases in some of the tasks and, decreases in others. The 2017 bond rates went into effect on April 1, 2017.

Bureau of Abandoned Mines Reclamation (BAMR) Projects/Status Report

Updates on reclamation projects were supplied by PA DEP's Bureau of Abandoned Mine Reclamation (BAMR). In the 2016 calendar year, there were 21 projects that reclaimed 239.1 acres, at a cost of \$10,082,436.00. In the 2017 calendar year, one project has been completed to date, reclaiming 0.0 acres at a cost of \$5,397.00. For

future completions, there are 42 contracts to reclaim 1,582.1 acres, at a cost of \$70,428,706.00. For future awards, there are 90 contracts to reclaim 2,225.6 acres, at a cost of \$101,389,918.00.

Coal Fees Regulatory Package

PA DEP met with the MRAB RLT Committee to revise the existing regulations regarding coal mining permit fees. Issues raised at that time included: 1) fee schedules (shifting from 6 years to 3 years); 2) permit fee tiers (pre-application vs. full application); 3) disproportionate fee increases (surface mining vs. underground mining); 4) administrative fees; 5) remaining incentives; 6) expansion of fee categories (for permit revisions, permit renewals and new bituminous underground mining permit applications); 7) identifying method to make the permit renewal process more efficient; 8) eliminating the requirement for Cumulative Hydrologic Impact Assessments (CHIAs) at every permit renewal; and 9)

Field Trip

The MRAB holds an annual field trip. The 2016 field trip was held on July 20, 2016. The acid mine drainage (AMD) treatment facilities visited during the field trip included: 1) *Big J-Mining Sorber Site*; 2) *Shade Mining No. 3/Shaulis Site*; 3) *Florence Mining No. 1 Site*; and 4) *the Flight 93 AMD Treatment Facility and Memorial*.

Land Reclamation Financial Guarantees (LRFG)

PA DEP provided regular updates on this topic, in terms of the number of LRFG operators and permits, along with the amount of funding to underwrite the LRFG. Matters regarding the benefit of raising the LRFG limit and, the relationship between new permits and the LRFG were also discussed.

National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permitting

PA DEP provided regular updates on the NPDES draft mining permits sent to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) for review. This is because the US EPA currently has oversight of the development of these permits. PA DEP is working to develop a guidance document and a permit template, all in order to address US EPA concerns. Once these items are completed, US EPA may end its oversight of the PA DEP NPDES permitting program for mining permits. As of April 15, 2017, 746 draft NPDES permits have been sent to the US EPA; 335 of these were issued without comment, while 359 of these were issued with minor comments. Additionally, 14 more permits could be issued with comments (minor), while 29 more permits could be issued without comments. Lastly, there are 9 permits pending; 5 of these with a 30-day wait and, 4 with comments (minor).

Non-Regulatory Agenda

PA DEP provided regular status reports on Technical Guidance Documents (TGDs), and reporting forms of the Mining Program, including; 1) *the Engineering Manual*; 2) *Processing Completion Reports*; 3) *Bonding – Direct Submittal of Bonds*; 4) *Blaster’s License Suspension*; 5) *Surface Water Protection – Underground Bituminous Mining Operations*; 6) *Pre-Applications*; 7) *Civil Penalties*; 8) *Beneficial*

Use of Coal Ash at Mine Sites (finalized 12/17/16); 9) General Permit Materials (finalized 8/20/16); and 10) Government-Financed Construction Contracts (GFCCs).

OSM Program Consistency Rule

PA DEP discussed the following items (both with the Board's Regulation, Legislation and Technical (RLT) Committee and, with the full Board (regarding whether PA DEP regulations should reflect what is in the Federal OSM language, for consistency):

1) defining the term "surface mining activities"; 2) assessment of penalties; 3) remining financial guarantees; and 4) effluent limits. The MRAB voted to recommend the adoption of the Federal language, with the understanding that further guidance will be forthcoming to clarify what activities qualify as surface mining activities. The MRAB also recommended that PA DEP proceed with the proposed rulemaking process for the regulatory package.

Permit Decision Guarantee (PDG)

On a regular basis, PA DEP provided updates on this program in response to the PDG operations, development of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) and checklists, and, concerns regarding the backlog of permits in the system.

Reclamation Fee Operation and Maintenance (O & M) Trust Account

PA DEP provided regular updates on the status of the Reclamation Fee Account, in terms of: 1) coal civil penalties collected and interest earned; 2) additional revenue transactions; and 3) LRFG premiums and interest.

Reclamation Fee Report

PA DEP shared a host of information regarding this report, including; *1) LRFG program approval; 2) fund transfers; 3) long-term sustainable revenues; 4) comments from other parties (i.e., Penn Future and the PA Coal Alliance); and 5) report changes (these were related to information regarding revenue projections, civil penalties and interest).*

Reclamation and Remining Incentives Report

PA DEP updated the Board on Pennsylvania's reclamation and remining incentives programs which have been very successful. Specific details can be found on MRAB's website presentations throughout the report period.

Regulatory Updates

PA DEP shared regular status reports on a variety of regulatory packages including: *1) Remining; 2) Federal Office of Surface Mining (OSM) Program Consistency; 3) Water Supply Replacement; 4) Blasting and Explosives; and 5) Coal Fees.*

Remining Financial Guarantees

PA DEP provided a historical overview of bond forfeitures, anticipated forfeitures, and their impacts on the Remining Financial Assurance Fund.

Revenues

PA DEP provided regular status reports on application fee revenues from two main sources: 1) *Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (SMCRA)*; and 2) *the Clean Water Fund (CWF)*.

Technical Deficiency Letter Reviews

PA DEP provided an assessment regarding the review of technical deficiency letters from among the six District Mining Offices (DMOs). The purpose of this assessment was three-fold: 1) *to determine issues contributing to delays of permit approvals*; 2) *to evaluate whether deficiencies were serious, significant or insignificant*; and 3) *to determine consistency and appropriateness of comments across DMOs*.

Visit from PA DEP Secretary Patrick McDonnell

PA DEP Secretary Patrick McDonnell (who was then in “Acting” capacity) visited the MRAB during its January 19, 2017 meeting. He thanked the MRAB for the following: 1) *its continued work with PA DEP*; 2) *facilitating conversation*; and 3) *its continued participation*. He mentioned that the Policy Office would be reviewing procedures regarding public participation, including advisory boards. He concluded by stressing the value of the e-permitting process to PA DEP and, to those who would utilize it.

Appendix A

BYLAWS OF THE MINING AND RECLAMATION ADVISORY BOARD

As Amended December 12, 1996

ARTICLE I

Authorization

The Mining and Reclamation Advisory Board is authorized and organized pursuant to Section 18(g) of the Pennsylvania Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (Act 181 of 1984) as amended by Act 173 of 1992.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

The advisory Board is charged to assist the secretary to expend the funds for the purposes provided by this act and to advise the secretary on all matters pertaining to surface coal mining and reclamation which shall include, but not be limited to, experimental practices, alternate methods of backfilling, selection of reclamation projects, alternate reclamation methods, obligations for pre-existing pollution liability, alteration of reclamation loans, reclamation fees and bonding rates and methods.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The Board shall be comprised of three coal operators, two of whom shall be licensed bituminous surface mine operators and one of whom shall be a licensed anthracite surface mine operator; four public members from the Citizens Advisory Council, who shall be appointed by the council; two members, one from the Anthracite and Bituminous Licensed Professional Engineers, and one from the County Conservation Districts, who shall be appointed by the State Conservation District Commission; four members of the General Assembly, two from the Senate, one member from the majority party and one member from the minority party, who shall be appointed by the president pro tempore; and two from the House of Representatives, one from the majority party and one from the minority party, who shall be appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives.

A. Board members shall designate an alternate. The chairperson shall be notified, in writing, of such alternate.

B. The Board may recommend to the appointing authority removal of any member not attending, or not represented by a designee, at two Board meetings in a year.

ARTICLE IV

Voting

Members, or designated alternates, shall be entitled to one vote, in person, on all matters that shall come before the Board. No voting shall be done without a quorum, unless otherwise indicated in these bylaws. A majority of the membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE V

Officers

The officers of the Board shall be a chairperson and a vice-chairperson.

The chairperson and vice chairperson shall be elected from the membership of the Board, as defined in the Pennsylvania Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act, as amended, and may not be the secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection, or his designee. They shall hold office for a term of one year, or until a successor is elected.

It shall be the duty of the chairperson to preside at all meetings of the Board, call special meetings, prepare and distribute the meeting agenda and perform such other duties as pertain to the office.

It shall be the duty of the vice-chairperson to perform the duties of the chairperson in his/her absence.

ARTICLE VI

Administration

Administrative and clerical duties shall be performed by the Office of Mineral Resources Management, Department of Environmental Protection. A department staff person shall function as a recording and corresponding secretary. Included among these administrative duties shall be:

- A. To give timely notice of meetings of the Board and committees.
- B. To record full Board and committee meeting minutes and keep a permanent file. Board and committee meeting minutes shall be distributed to the full membership. Minutes should be reviewed by the chairperson or vice-chairperson prior to distribution.
- C. To conduct both outgoing and incoming correspondence and maintain a permanent file of such correspondence, and

- D. To perform such other duties as may be requested by the Board, including, but not limited to, travel arrangements, conference calls, etc.

In addition, staff representatives from the Office of Mineral Resources Management shall serve as staff liaison to the Board.

ARTICLE VII

Committees

The Board may establish committees to assist in performing its advisory duties.

- A. Committees shall be established by a majority vote of those members attending a regular or special meeting of the Board.
- B. The Board chairperson shall appoint committee members. The committee chairperson shall be selected by its members. The committee chairperson will be responsible for calling committee meetings, requesting needed assistance from DEP, and reporting to the Board, and shall receive necessary administrative and clerical support from DEP.
- C. Each committee shall develop and adopt a statement of purpose or objective of the committee at a meeting of that committee after its creation.
- D. The chairperson of the Board shall appoint a committee to prepare the Annual Report, as mandated by Section 18(g) of the Pennsylvania Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act.
- E. A listing of the committees and their statements of purpose shall be maintained as an appendix to these bylaws. Changes to the appendix shall not constitute a change to the bylaws.

ARTICLE VIII

Meetings

The Board shall meet on the first Thursday of the months of January and July and the fourth Thursday of the months of April and October, unless changed by a majority of the members. Alternate meeting dates and special meetings shall be called by the chairperson, in consultation with the vice-chairperson. Committee meetings shall be called by committee chairpersons, who shall also notify the full Board.

ARTICLE IX

Participation by Non-Board Members

- A. Formal Presentation

Any person may ask the Board for time on the formal agenda to present policy, regulatory or legislative concerns for the Board to consider. The request shall be made in writing to the chairperson and include a summary of

the presentation. The chairperson shall determine the interest of the Board in the subject and decide if the presentation will be allowed during the formal agenda. Requests shall be submitted at least one month prior to a Board meeting.

B. Informal Discussion

At the discretion of the chairperson, any person present at the meeting shall be afforded the opportunity to speak to the Board or ask questions of Board members.

ARTICLE X
Amendments

The bylaws may be amended, repealed or suspended at any meeting of the Board by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Board, provided that written notice of such amendment, repeal or suspension shall have been sent to each member at least one week prior to said meeting.

ARTICLE XI
Board Representation

The Board shall act as a body in all matters before it and only the chairperson, or his or her designee, the vice-chairperson or the Board's designee shall speak on behalf of the Board.
