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PROCEEDINGS

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CHAIR CHARLES BENNETT:

Okay. I've got a prepared statement here that I need to read before we start the meeting.

Again, I welcome you to the public hearing. It's the State Water Plan Regional Committee input on water resources management issues. I'd like to, again, welcome you this evening to the Potomac Regional Water Resources public hearing to solicit input on water resources management issues in the Potomac River basin. My name is Charles Bennett, and I represent the Potomac Regional Water Resources Committee. With me this evening are members of the Potomac Regional Water Resources Committee and staff from the Department of Environmental Protection.

The purpose of this hearing is to solicit input on water resources management issues in the Potomac basin. This hearing satisfies the requirements of Act 220 of 2002, known as the Water Resources Planning Act, which requires that each regional committee hold at least one combined public meeting and hearing within its region to solicit input on water resources management and water resources planning within the region.

Notice of this meeting was published in the <u>Pennsylvania Bulletin</u> on February 5th, 2005 and again on April 30th, 2005. The meeting was also advertised in the <u>Harrisburg Patriot News</u> and locally in the Public Opinion.

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In order to give everyone an equal opportunity to comment this evening, I'd like to establish the following ground rules. I will call upon the witnesses who have pre-registered to testify at this evening's hearing as included on the schedule After hearing from these witnesses, of the witnesses. I will provide any other interested parties with the opportunity to testify as time allows this evening. Oral testimony is limited to ten minutes for each witness. Organizations are requested to designate one witness to present testimony on its behalf. witness is asked to submit three written copies of his or her testimony to aid in transcribing the hearing. Please hand me your copies prior to presenting your When presenting your testimony, please testimonv. state your name for the record prior to presenting We would also appreciate your help in your testimony. spelling your names and any terms you may use that may not generally be familiar to us so the transcript can be as accurate as possible.

In addition to, or in place of, oral 1 testimony tonight, interested persons may also submit 2 written comments on this proposal. All comments must 3 be received by the Water Planning Office on or before June 30th, 2005. I'd like to now call for the first witness that registered. And I need to announce to you that no one has registered to present at tonight's hearing. However, if there are folks who did not register that would like to officially go on the record with a statement regarding the hearing tonight,

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we would appreciate you stepping forward, you are welcome to go on the official record in the hearing. Yes, sir?

Will all the comments and testimony be compiled for public viewing with resolutions to those comments and recommendations?

CHAIR BENNETT:

We just read in the prepared statement that there's not going to be a response document. The comments received this evening will be part of the meeting materials that are presented to our committee at the August meeting, and those are all on the web for public viewing. And that was just a question. Is it a question or is it a hearing comment?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:

Just a question.

CHAIR BENNETT:

Another question? Okay, it's not on the record then. We'll take a couple questions.

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MR. RETTIG:

My name is Stephen Rettig. I'm speaking as president of the Antietam Watershed Association in Pennsylvania. Basically, my comments as you perceive

on the paper are suggestive for a course of information for your study and recommendations. 3 | read them as printed on the paper with number one. Washington Township Municipal Authority recently finished a wellhead protection study on all water 5 sources in Washington Township to be used for consumption by the same, and other customers. 7 Washington Township is about one half of the area in 8 the Antietam Watershed in Pennsylvania. The study was recently --- just recently submitted and presented to 10 It would be available through WTMA, or the public. 11 Washington Township Offices Proper. The study was 12 done by ARM, A-R-M, in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. The contact person at ARM is Steve Read, a hydrogeologist 14 who did the assessment. 1.5

Number two, the Antietam Watershed
Association is the recipient of a small watershed
legacy grant in partnership with other organizations.
\$15,000 is set aside for an assessment of a segment of
the east branch of the Antietam Creek. This is the
branch and groundwater adjacent to the same, which
supplies the majority of the wells of Washington
Township. This stream assessment will be available as
a resource if desired when finished. The assessment
is being done by the Center for Watershed Protection

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of Ellicott City, Maryland.

Number three, the Antietam Watershed
Association has formed a stream monitoring group,
which has been in training through Allarm, a group
affiliated with Dickinson College in Carlisle,
Pennsylvania. The volunteer group has been trained in
scientifically accurate techniques of monitoring
various items at a number of sites on the east branch
of the Antietam. This will spread to the west branch
also. As this data is collected and compiled by the
Antietam Watershed Association and Allarm, it will be
available also as a resource to measure the integrity
of the east branch of the Antietam Creek and
eventually the west branch.

Franklin County has a comprehensive plan, which may be helpful in assessing the entire area of Franklin County, much of which is in the Potomac basin.

Washington Township has compiled a comprehensive plan, which may be of help. And the entire of this township is in the Potomac River basin.

The Nature Conservancy has recently done and published a study of Franklin County, centering around the endangered species and sensitive natural areas. This report is available in bound form or on

CD. Their main office is in Pennsylvania --- is in Middletown, Pennsylvania.

And, finally, the main offices for
Michaux State Forest may also be a good resource for
assessing water supply and maintenance of the same in
the Potomac Watershed in Pennsylvania, as the southern
tip of the state forest supplies the water flowing
into the Potomac in Franklin County.

I hope these resources will be helpful in assessing the Pennsylvania State wide water plan.
