The two-day summit was held in Grantville, PA at the beautiful casino overlooking the race track. The program was designed to be highly technical but flexible enough to provide time for group interaction and separate work groups. Presentations discussed issues directly related to the Partnership steps and programs available to assist operators as they move forward.

We also heard about missteps and successes from systems that have been through the Partnership program. In particular, John Bartol, who has been through the Phase III portion twice—with two different water systems—gave everyone a unique look at the development tools used as his staff worked through their self analysis. He felt the program was essential in bringing the staff together on

such key items as process control and filter maintenance.

John said, "the tools provided by the Partnership program were and are the reason behind the success of our recent expansion and our continued improvement." John also noted that the staff was initially apprehensive about the program, but after preliminary meetings they embraced the effort and benefited from the results.

We also heard from our Phase IV Facility, Carlisle Borough, as Mike McFadden discussed their experiences with the unique challenges required of a facility as they approach Phase IV status. Mike explained changes they made at the plant in both equipment and operations necessary to reach their optimization goals laid out in the program. Mike felt that the goals are clear and the operators recognize what needs to be done to maintain this level of operation. Mike and his staff would welcome your call.

The summit moved quickly both days, run efficiently by the PA-AWWA staff. Plans are underway for a similar event in 2013

The operators of the Borough of Carlisle were honored recently for their work in bringing the Carlisle water treatment plant up to the Phase IV level in the Partnership for Safe Water Optimization Program.

Phase IV status in the Partnership Program is truly a unique standing, placing the plant and the operators as one of only eight facilities nationwide that have obtained this level of optimized treatment. After receiving the award, Plant Supervisor Mike McFadden said "although challenging, the work necessary to realize the Phase IV status brought our entire staff together as a team and provided real and measurable goals and results. The exercise was well worth the time invested and I would recommend that other Phase III level plants investigate this next level in the Program."

The Phase IV level of the Program is an attainable goal for many of the water facilities currently operating at the Phase III point. In fact, many of the plants visited by Partnership representatives throughout the year are already operating at or above the Phase IV level due to the work and techniques learned during the Phase II and Phase III portions of the Program. PfSW Rep. Bob Donnelly noted that "while we have three solid systems currently working toward the Phase IV level at this time, there are many more that are both capable and performing at the levels necessary for consideration."

The Partnership for Safe Water is comprised of many varied and interesting water plants. One such plant is the City of Cumberland/Evitts Creek Water Company's water treatment plant which is very distinctive in terms of both location and processes. The plant is located in Bedford County Pennsylvania and provides water to the Evitts Creek community in Pennsylvania and to the City of Cumberland, Maryland.

The City of Cumberland/Evitts Creek Water Company's plant is also one of the few plants that utilize Dissolved Air Flotation (DAF) instead of the conventional sedimentation process. The DAF process brings coagulated particles to the surface of the particle removal basin with thousands of microbubbles. The agglomerated particles are then skimmed off the surface leaving behind a clarified DAF basin effluent that feeds the plants 11 multimedia filters.

The City of Cumberland/ Evitts Creek Water Company - who joined the Partnership last summer - utilize their innovative, somewhat unique DAF process to help continuously fulfill their impressive operational standards that mirror the high quality, continuous improvement principles of the Partnership for Safe Water.

Partnership Reps Attend joint AWWA-WWOAP conferences

Partnership representatives attended, set up a static display and presented at three recent joint AWWA-WWOAP conferences in the north-east and south-east parts of the state. These are key gettogethers for water operators and personnel as they provide recent technical updates and current events important in the water treatment industry.
