#### IMPACTS OF A CHANGING CLIMATE

- Increased frequency of extreme weather events
  - Heavy precipitation, flooding, heavy winds, storms
- Rising Temperatures
  - Water shortages, degraded air quality, wildfires
- Economic
  - Storm damage, disruption of businesses
- Environmental Impacts
  - Agriculture, wildlife habitats
- Social Impacts
  - Vulnerable populations, public health & safety






#### CHALLENGES & CONSIDERATIONS FACED BY LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

- Transportation infrastructure
- Utility infrastructure & facilities
- Provision of water
- Increased demand for electricity & telecommunications
- Loss of wetlands
- Public health & safety
- And others....





#### PENNSYLVANIA MUNICIPALITIES PLANNING CODE, ACT 247 OF 1968



- Referenced as the MPC.
- Governing law for planning in Pennsylvania.
- Identifies tools, requirements and restrictions for planning.
- Vests authority in local governments and their elected officials.
- Local governments are also required to follow the body of law established by court decisions.




#### WHAT IS A COMPREHENSIVE PLAN?

- Decision making guide
- Guides future actions of a community
- Reflects community's vision for the future
- Addresses all activities affecting local gov't
- Goals & Objectives
- Not Regulatory





#### MUNICIPAL, MULTI-MUNICIPAL & COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLANS



- Governing bodies may adopt and amend comprehensive plans (MPC § 302 (a))
  - Municipal plans Optional
  - Multi-municipal plans Optional & Encouraged
  - County plans Required (MPC § 301.4)
- Municipal plans shall be generally consistent with the county plan (MPC § 301 (a)(5))



#### REQUIRED COMPREHENSIVE PLAN ELEMENTS (MPC § 301)

- Land use plan
- Housing plan
- Transportation plan
- Community facilities & utilities plan
- Natural & historic resources plan
- Water supply plan

- Additional requirements for county plans include:
  - Agriculture plan
  - Historic preservation plan

# Minimum Requirements



#### **ENERGY CONSERVATION PLAN ELEMENT (MPC § 301.1)**

"To promote energy conservation and the effective utilization of renewable energy sources, the comprehensive plan may include an energy conservation plan element..."





#### COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE & REVIEW REQUIREMENTS

- County plans shall be updated every 10 years. (MPC § 302 (d))
- Municipal or multi-municipal plans shall be reviewed at least every 10 years. (MPC § 301 (c))
- Recommendation is for plans to be reviewed annually.





#### TOOLS FOR PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

- Zoning Ordinance
- Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance
- Official Map Ordinance
- Capital Improvement Programs
- Tax Incentives





### WHAT DOES ZONING REGULATE? (MPC § 603)



- Uses of land, watercourses and other bodies of water.
- Size, height, bulk, location, erection, construction, repair, maintenance, alteration, razing, removal and use of structures.
- Density and intensity of use.
- Protection and preservation of natural, historic and agricultural resources.




#### WHAT DOES A SALDO REGULATE?


- Lot layout & design
  - Adequate sites for development
- Design & construction standards for required improvements
  - Streets, sidewalks, lighting, stormwater, landscaping, buffer areas, etc.
- Adequate provision for water & sewage facilities





#### WHAT IS AN OFFICIAL MAP?








## OTHER PLANS & ORDINANCES



#### ACT 167 OF 1978, STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

- Counties prepare or update and adopt county-wide, or watershed stormwater management plans.
- Reviewed/approved by PA DEP
- Plans provide municipalities with standards, criteria, and ordinances to regulate and control stormwater.
- Municipalities enact ordinances to implement plan and recommendations.





#### HAZARD MITIGATION PLANS

- Identify hazards & risks and develop ways to mitigate losses of life and property.
- Multi-jurisdictional plans prepared every 5 years.
- Reviewed/approved by PEMA & FEMA
- FEMA mitigation grant programs require federally approved HMP for eligibility.
- Guidance provided by PEMA





#### FLOOD HAZARD ORDINANCES



- The National Flood Insurance Program(NFIP) makes flood insurance available in participating communities.
- To participate, municipalities must adopt a floodplain management ordinance that meets or exceeds the minimum NFIP criteria.
