# Senate Bill Proposed Repurposing of AML Funds

- Senate appropriations bill proposes to repurpose \$515 million of IIJA AML funds for wildland fire management
- Proposed amount to come from unobligated balance of previously appropriated funds in the IIJA
- OSMRE has not provided any opinions on how the repurposing may occur as this is just a proposal

# Senate Bill Proposed Repurposing Funding Impacts

1. Unobligated national AML IIJA fund balance is \$8.0 Billion over the next 11 years.
2. Proposed repurpose of \$515 Million is a 6.5% reduction of AML IIJA funding.
3. With no proposal of repurposing, Pennsylvania is on pace to receive \$2.7 Billion of AML IIJA funding over the next 11 years (\$245 Million each year).
4. If Senate Bill 2431 is passed, Pennsylvania would lose \$174 Million of AML IIJA funding over the next 11 years (\$15.8 Million each year).

# Proposed Repurposing Future Project Priorities

1. The Reclamation of Priority 1 and 2 Health and Safety Hazards
2. Abatement of AMD in Priority Watersheds
3. Reclamation of Priority 3 Environmental Problems and Lower Priority Watersheds
4. Economic Revitalization Projects where AML Reclamation and AMD Abatement Work is completed first

# Proposed Repurposing Project Impacts

- Reclamation priorities would not change
- Project sizes and scopes may need to be smaller to accommodate less funding
- Less reclamation may be completed
- Grant funding and grant rounds may be reduced
- Emergencies and health and safety hazards would be our top priority
