Coal Mining Program Background

- Permits
 - -~1600 Coal Mining Permits
- Operators
 - -~500 Permittees
- Program Cost
 - Total ~\$21,000,000
 - up to 50% Federal Funding

Regulation Development Timeline

- Fee Proposal-October 2009 MRAB Meeting
 - Opposition was expressed
 - Relegated to committee for discussion
- MRAB Committee Meetings

 November 2009-January 2010
- January 2010 MRAB Recommendations
- April 2010 MRAB Recommendation

January 2010 MRAB Recommendations

- Because permit fees have not gone up since 1982, a permit fee increase is reasonable.
- Any increase in permit fees should be dedicated exclusively to finance the mining program permitting fee process.
- DEP should not do anything to discourage or provide disincentives to remining activities and their reclamation benefits to the State.
- It is reasonable to ask industry to contribute to funding some part of the program.
- MRAB will continue to advise DEP on appropriate permit fee assessment and allocations.

April 2010 MRAB Recommendation

- Fee package should include permit application fees
- Fees should generate about \$400,000 per year

Fees to the Mining Program

86.3(b) Permit Application Fees required by this Chapter for permit applications submitted pursuant to the Coal Refuse Disposal Control Act will be used by the Department to cover its costs to review such applications.

Proposed 86.17(c)

For surface coal mine facilities, coal refuse reprocessing facilities, and coal mining activity facilities, except for bituminous underground mines, all Permit Application Fees collected shall be deposited in the Surface Mining Conservation and **Reclamation Fund. Permit Application Fees** collected for bituminous underground mines shall be deposited in the Bituminous Mine Subsidence and Land Reclamation Fund. For coal refuse disposal facilities, all Permit Application Fees collected shall be deposited in the Coal Refuse Disposal Control Fund.

- Review time for each application type

- Personnel costs
- Overhead
- Proportion needed to generate \$400,000

 ~37% of state share of cost for application review

Periodic Fee Review

The Department will review the adequacy of the Permit Application Fees established in this section at least once every three years and shall provide a written report to the **Environmental Quality Board.** The report shall identify any disparity between the amount of program income generated by the fees and the costs to administer these programs, and it shall contain recommendations to increase fees to eliminate the disparity, including recommendations for regulatory amendments to increase program fees.

Summary and Recommendation
